




Why do people want to play NAB AFL Auskick?




Reader note: while these stories have been developed to support all young people's participation in footy, we recommend that you speak with your child about the concepts and examples in a way that is relevant to your child.





Sometimes, I wonder why people want to play Auskick. Sometimes, playing games inside on computers and tablets seems like more fun.








There are lots of good reasons to play Auskick.

This can help keep my body healthy, fit and strong!








Playing Auskick gets me outside in the fresh air.

I can go and watch a footy game in my local neighbourhood or I can watch my favourite footy team at an AFL game.








I can talk about football with my friends. I can talk about football with my family.
